Exactly 11 months ago, the Maize Rage stormed the court after a game that seemed an omen for good things to come. At the time, Michigan was 8-16 and had suffered humiliating losses to Central Michigan and Harvard. If you were a senior at Michigan, you hadn't seen your basketball team or football team (okay, maybe some things don't change) beat Ohio State during your time at the University. Your basketball team hadn't made the NCAA Tournament in a decade. But for one moment, the failures of the past were forgotten with a huge 80-70 victory over the Buckeyes. And indeed that omen proved prophetic, as U-M has looked like a whole different team this year, cracking the Top 25 and putting itself in excellent position to break the tournament drought. But the work is far from over. With the win last year, Michigan became relevant once again. Today, we can take one more step toward finally capitalizing on that success.

\*BUM OF THE GAME: William Buford is tonight's Bum of the Game. Chant "BUM" whenever he touches the ball and if the center section asks "What's the matter with Buford?" respond: "He's a bum. Bum-bum-bum-bum-bum-bum!"

Club benchwarmer: Following in the footsteps of the great Pete Burak, Ohio State sports two student managers-turned-basketball players: junior guards **Danny Peters** (#13) and **Mark Titus** (#34). OSU's media guide describes Titus's switch from the bench to, well, still the bench by saying that he "soon decided playing more to his liking." (1. Yeah, I'm sure it was totally his decision, and 2. Does playing two minutes this season really count as "playing"?). The real reason was clearly his superior writing skills. Titus started a blog called "Club Trillion: Life Views from the End of the Bench," in which he discusses his unique position on the team. Some highlights:

Sleepless in Seattle: Tonight the 1989 National Championship team will be honored at halftime. It was 20 years ago in Seattle, Washington that the Wolverines stunned the world and won the NCAA Tournament under rookie coach Steve Fisher. The team was led by All-American Glen Rice, who set an NCAA Tournament record with 184 points (a record that still stands today!) But more famous was the clutch play of point guard Rumeal Robinson in the championship game against Seton Hall. With only three seconds left, and the Wolverines down two, Robinson stepped to the line and hit two HUGE free throws to give the Wolverines the lead... and their first National Championship. The team will honor that title tonight by wearing the jerseys from that championship game.

Thanks for the memories: In the more recent past, Ohio State provided the Wolverines with the high point of their 2008 season. It was nearly a year ago that the Wolverines upset the Buckeyes here at Crisler, 80-70. The game was truly a sign of things to come this season, as DeShawn Sims scored 27 points while Manny Harris added 22 for the biggest win of the season. Even though OSU wasn't ranked, the victory was so sweet that the students rushed the court – between football and basketball it was the first victory since the football team's 35-21 win in 2003.

Player intros: We will chant the name of the Michigan player about to be introduced even while the opposing team's names are read. Check with the center section beforehand to determine the order in which our players will be introduced. They will be posted up on a whiteboard and shared with everybody before the introductions.

PEEDI: Instead of chanting "De-Shawn Si-ims" when he is introduced, chant "PEE-DI" (his nickname) instead.

## Histo's Corner:

Michigan is 71-89 all-time against Ohio State, but is 43-35 at home. Last year, U-M upset the Buckeyes, 80-70, in what was the Wolverines' first win against OSU in their last nine tries.

When Michigan is ranked in the 20-25 range in either poll, they are 2-1 against Ohio State. The loss was in 2006; the wins came in 1996 and 1998.

The 1989 National Championship team was 2-0 against Ohio State, winning by a combined margin of 43 points.
