Good evening Maize Rage and welcome back to Crisler for what should be an exciting game. A heartbreaking highlight of the Wildcats' season came a month ago with their home court loss to our undefeated Wolverines. They put up an impressive performance that made all who were watching nervous up until the final second with a missed three-point shot that could have won them the game. Not only did they almost win, but the Wildcats held us to our second lowest scoring game of the season. They're coming in with revenge on their minds—let's show them what our home court advantage has to offer.

Comeback?: The Wildcats have been a rollercoaster ride of success in the past few years starting with their first ever NCAA Tournament appearance in the 2016-2017 season and win over Vanderbilt in the first round. Things were looking up for their program until the 2017-2018 season where they went 6-12 in conference play and did not make it back to the tournament. This season they seem to be back on track, currently 10-6 overall with several close games under their belt. They'll be looking for their season defining win tonight.

Transfer Hopes: Part of the more successful season is not only from the veteran seniors Vic Law and Dererk Pardon, but also from a transfer from Evansville—Ryan Taylor. As a graduate transfer, over 40 schools were interested in adding this 6'6 guard to their programs. He caused guite a buzz last season when he finally chose to become a Wildcat and has made it his mission to make sure that the 2017 NCAA Tournament appearance was not a fluke. He leads the team in 3 pointers with 39 and is third on the team in points per game with 12.4. The formidable upperclassmen trio of Law, Pardon, and Taylor will no doubt make for an interesting night in Crisler Center.

Six-Headed Monster: The Wolverines roll back into Crisler Center after a 79-69 win at Illinois, which was neither uncomfortable nor particularly relaxing. The reason for this being that no single player was able to take control of the game for the Wolverines. Instead, it was a team effort, with all five starters finishing with double-digit points and Isaiah Livers pouring in 9 in his first game back from missing the previous two with back spasms. The ability of this team to spread out its scoring makes it very difficult for opponents to figure out who to focus on, which will be a strength come tourney time.

Throwback Point Guard on 90's Night: Zavier Simpson has been playing like an old man. This is not an insult, but rather a compliment.
